COVID QUARANTINING

This year more than ever we have been spending most of our time close to home, alongside our families. This excessive amount of time can be a trigger for conflict. I too am a busy working mum with three children. Sometimes it can feel like refereeing rather than parenting! I have had many conversations with families over the last few months about just such pressures. Resolving conflict between siblings and between us and our children, requires skill, subtlety and self-control. It means that we need to have a range of responses at our fingertips rather than just rely on one or two strategies.

Here are 5 emotionally intelligent responses that you can call on to de-escalate family and sibling conflict:

1 Stay calm: When emotions are charged in a group, the leader will be the person who stays calm. Families are no different. Emotions can be charged. This is the time for parents to stay calm. Use a low, 'Green' tone of voice when you talk with kids. Your calmness is essential to de-escalate anger.

2. Use open-ended questions: Ask open-ended questions to encourage others to share their feelings about a situation. Say, "How can I help?" instead of "You seem angry". Children and young people are calmer when they are teaching or explaining rather than being patronised.

3. Hear the feeling rather than see the behaviour: Empathise with children's feelings without accepting their behaviour. There is nothing better than being understood so when they are upset try statements like "You have every right to be angry about that." Avoid addressing the behaviour at this point. Choose a time when everyone is calm and ready to listen to talk about better ways of behaving.

4. Use selective listening: In the heat of the moment children and young people, like parents, will often say things they don't mean. It's easy to respond to the heated "I hate you." or other insults while ignoring the original problem. When a child yells "You never listen..." Try clarifying by saying, "It seems that the last time we spoke wasn't great for you." Show interest, take the wind from the sails by agreeing, and don't try to respond to everything someone says in anger.

5. Focus on facts, not emotions: Many people (adults and children) don't respond well when they are second guessed. "Why are you so angry?" invites the response "NO, I'm NOT!" Instead say, "What happened that caused you to be upset?" Be sure to compliment children when they resolve relationship problems calmly and control their own emotions, demonstrating the impact that their positive behaviour has on you. Conversely, compliments such as - "Thanks guys for resolving this problem quickly and calmly. I appreciate it." - remind kids about the emotional impact that their negative behaviour also has.

Dear Parent/Guardian,

I would like to offer your child an opportunity to apply for placement in the 7C Class in 2021.

7C is an extension class based on the 6Cs, which are the future focused skills of:

- Communication (listening and sharing ideas clearly and concisely)
- Collaboration (working with others)
- Creativity (expressing, thinking and doing things in new ways)
- Critical thinking (problem solving)
- Citizenship (becoming more globally aware and proactive in the community)
- Character (being a responsible and caring individual)

Future focused learning prepares students across all curriculum areas and learning stages with the skills and capabilities to thrive in a rapidly changing and interconnected world. Students will collaborate and use creative and critical thinking to solve complex problems and become mindful global citizens.

Students will be offered a differentiated and integrated curriculum that develops transferable skills and provides enrichment options to best meet the needs of motivated students and independent learners.

Future focused learning environments inspire students to be leaders of their own learning. Student led conferences, a 7C class review at the end of each term and ongoing feedback and evaluation between teachers and students will be utilised to monitor student participation and performance in the class.

The application process for the 7C class will consist of the following:

- 1. Submission of the 7C Class Application Form- which includes a supporting statement written by the student (attached to this letter).
- 2. Portfolio of work samples that demonstrate the student's willingness and ability to be an independent learner and use of the 6C skills.

Applications will close on 11 November 2020 (Week 5 Term 4) and can be submitted in person to Hawkesbury High School or by email on <u>hawkesbury-h.school@det.nsw.edu.au</u>.

Successful candidates will be notified of placement in the 7C class by 1 December 2020.
